Bedford Junior Blues Girls Rugby

Women's rugby is on the up. Whether it be numbers of girls playing at grass roots level, or the ladies getting more TV time - you are likely to see them playing, more than ever before.

My small journey with girls rugby started in the first months of 2016 when, after getting a Scotland Six Nations jumper for Christmas, my six year old daughter asked if she could play rugby. As somewhat of a distant rugby fan myself, not playing since my own school days it was not something I expected to hear. But inspired by the jumper and a classmate who played in the Bedford Junior Blues Minis team, she had no perception of it being a 'boys sport'. So with a pair of football boots in hand, we ventured over to Wentworth Drive on a cold Sunday morning to see what was what.

Well, after just an hour of finding her way around the pitch and being supported by the excellent Head Coach, Andy Bennett, she was determined she would return; to the extent that we even picked her up a match shirt and other kit items from the club shop as we departed! That was day one.

The season continued through the Spring of 2016 as she got to know more about the game and to find a place amongst her new friends' group. With a small handful of other girls in the team, she was not alone, she happily teamed up with the boys when 1-on-1 training exercises were required. I too also found some like minded parents to be sociable with on the touch lines. With my camera in hand, I took sporting shots for the annual family album and to send to the proud grandparents.



By the time the 2018 season kicked off, she was a competitive equal to many of the boys and I was the de facto squad photographer! Noticing that the Head Coach had a very busy time getting bibs handed out, speaking to parents with questions and all manner of other administrative matters, I decided to offer some help. I concede, my heart wanted to be asked to put my boots back on and help out with coaching, but the call to be our Team Manager seemed a better fit. It probably also stopped me going down a dangerous path

that might have seen me believe I could even play in a veterans team, more than 20 years after I last grasped a ball! Understandably, there is quite a bit of admin and organisation when it comes to kids clubs. I felt by taking this away from the Head Coach, I could allow him to focus on his real value; teaching the kids and coaching the coaches.

The two following seasons were perfect. Our squad number grew. Our kids all enjoyed their Sunday morning outing and we were able to pick up a few more coaches from the onlooking parents. What could possibly go wrong! Well, when the 2019 season rolled over into March 2020, as with many others, our fun was stopped by COVID. After a few weeks of wondering 'how long will this last' the Blues put in place a great Sunday alternative of Zoom training



sessions with guest coaches from the Blues. Our kids quickly adapted to joining in from their living rooms and remaining involved with the club and their friends. We had a few start-stop attempts to return to Sunday training at Wentworth Drive. Lots of extra health & safety protocol, but this considered well worth it to get the kids back out on the pitch.

The 2021/22 season allowed us to get back more regularly to training and competitive matches with neighbouring clubs. Our girls numbers even blossomed with a couple more taking an interest during the Six Nations period. We ended the season in recent weeks with our U11s squad at around 45 kids, of which six of our regular attendees were our girls. I also became slightly busier, during the last couple of seasons. My elder daughter, 13 at the time, felt she was missing out on the fun and asked to join the Girls squad too. So now with two daughters playing in different age groups, I would regularly spend my entire morning (and some of the afternoon) at Wentworth Drive on a Sunday. It was, however, a great way to get involved with the Junior Girls squad and start to make the relationships with the coaches and other volunteers. before my youngest and her team mates joins them next season. I wonder if I will get my boots, my camera, or my laptop out then. Probably all three!

Looking forwards to the 2022/23 season, our U12s girls are required by RFU rules, to split from the boys and 'go it alone'. So, we will embark on a new season with the BJB Girls squad. With girls from U12s up to U18s, the Junior Girls team has quietly over the last eight years become established under the guidance and care provided by Head Coach Mark Stapley. With good numbers in all the age groups pre-COVID, Mark even embarked on establishing a Womens team. I think we could say he started well, with the Blues Women having a very impressive first season in the league and taking the title with an unbeaten scorecard. This inspiring performance acts as a motivation for some of the girls that play in Bedford Junior Blues today. I am delighted that a few of the Blues Women even manage to find the time in their own schedules to come along and support the coaches with our girls training. It gives our club a great community and support feeling.

With small numbers, the Blues Junior Girls face a challenge just to exist for the coming years. Collaborating with some local clubs, we will continue to give our girls an opportunity to play competitive matches and to train with a wider group of friends. Let there be no doubt about the passion our girls have for rugby. At the recent end of season awards for the Bedford Junior Blues, they certainly made themselves known with great cheering for their teammates and bringing joyful support to the proceedings. With continued support from the club and the volunteers, I look forward to seeing our girls inspiring others to take up rugby. Seeing is believing.

The season from a parents perspective

When Solveig asked me to provide her with a view of the season from a parents perspective I wondered where to start; we are just fans following the Blues, home and away hoping the boys excel. We'd say for 90% of our feelings are just that but perhaps the other 10% is a little different.

Pre - season you hope they get to fitness without injury. 2021-22, Dean picked up an injury that saw him miss the first 4 matches of the season. We still enjoyed the start of the season and in particular the first game - away to Jersey with Jill and Simon Lane. It was a great trip; weather, the hotel and the boys put in a good performance, despite the loss even a Jersey fan we sat near, said the result could have gone either way.

We remember the Ampthill game fondly, away after a home Donny win. The sun shone and the boys excelled with running rugby and a hat full of tries. The only negative was the lack of drink which ran out before the match started!

Hartpury away was another stand out game, Deans first game back after injury. A tough first half in very wet conditions and the home team were edging the game. But the half time talk must have been special the Blues came out in the second half and with tries aplenty and a change in the game management, ran away with the match 42-19 win away to a good team - COYB's.

Pre-match at home with Dean, follows a similar route. Dean has been back with us since returning from France. We see his morning ritual; a strong coffee to start the day and a bowl of porridge and banana. This will be followed by a game of FIFA or catching up on a rugby game from down under. He'll usually continue to relax before getting his kit together. Mum still asks if he has got everything; got a towel got your gum shield. That ritual hasn't changed since he was 5. He's shortly moving out but I am sure his mum will still be thinking about his kit!!!

The run in to Christmas was good with 3 wins in 4, culminating in the home win against Jersey, when we won that boxing day fixture. The Boxing Day fixture is always one of our favourites and a game we look out for when the fixtures are announced. We try to plan a bit of Christmas around the fixture home or away we try to get there if we can. Over 4000 turned out to see the Blues win 28-19; a close fought game but one which saw the Blues rise to the top as they often do on Boxing Day in front of the festive home crowd. Lunch in the marquee is one of our favourite ways to enjoy the day with a few beers / Proseccos pre and post match.

We had a tough start to 2022, with back to back losses. When the Blues lose the catch up with Dean is usually fairly short. We run through the highlights and areas that didn't go too well but you can't win them all and just sometimes all the effort doesn't bring the desired result. The first few losses all seemed to be by narrow margins and thus we remained optimistic. That said the Donny result was a bit of a low point to "nil" the Blues was difficult to take and the journey home wasn't great but we put it down to one of those games.

The next game was away to Ealing and like many of the games we travelled with Jill and Simon, whilst we travelled with hope we also had a feeling that it may be a tough day for the boys, after 4 consecutive losses. The plastic pitch would suit Ealing and the past had seen the boys get nasty burns and on a sunny afternoon, we saw 4 of the backs come out in skins/leggings to protect themselves. They should do that every week, based on what followed. One of the best performances of the year. With great intensity, determination and management of the game, the Blues began

to dominate and you could see Ealing begin to worry, as the game progressed. Bedford didn't crack under pressure and grew into the game. The travelling crowd got noisier and cheered the team on to the final whistle with jubilant celebrations when it did finally go. A beer afterwards to celebrate and a very enjoyable car journey home. That game showed us, that we could beat any championship team on our day.

After that the results yo-yoed a bit. The Coventry game at home was particularly disappointing; the weather wasn't pleasant and we didn't get the rub of the green on the day. Coventry slowed the game down any way they could to stop us playing our high tempo game and it paid dividends as they won by 2 points - another narrow loss.

The final league game of the season saw an away trip to London Scottish it also happened to be Mike Rayer's 500th game as Director of Rugby. So we travelled with plenty of hope for another "Blues" game; entertaining the crowd with tries and flowing rugby and of course a win to celebrate Mike's 500th game. That record is very special and the boys were going to ensure the celebrations could be on and off the pitch. The first half wasn't quite going to plan and Scottish were winning but the half time talk led to a turn around and a "barn storming" second half, which led to the Blues winning 62-21. The boys threw the ball around and kept up a high tempo which left the opposition chasing shadows. After the game the players did their usual thanks to the travelling fans and then for the special moment - approached Mike and thanked him in the usual way. The followers then presented Mike with a glass plaque, a thank you to a man who has seen the club entertain for the last 16-17 years. A special day to end the league season and see the team take 5th spot in the league.

Next to the cup 2 legs v Nottingham with an away leg first on a Friday night under lights. Nottingham started well, but Bedford began to take control of the game and built the score through great kicking and a flurry of tries to take a 47-22 win back to Goldington Rd. The away leg saw Dean picked up a hat-trick which took him to 100 tries for the Blues. An emotional moment for him and us; we were both proud of his achievement, but he always tells us as a winger, his success is often dependent on the team. Rugby, more than many sports, is very much a "team" game. Looking back to when he was a 5 year old, running around the pitch, like a bee around a honey pot, who'd have thought he'd have achieved that milestone.

On to the 2nd leg home advantage and we went to Goldington Rd with confidence, hoping the game wouldn't be our last of the season. The team scored 8 tries in a flowing game which we won 52-17. On to the Quarter final and keeping our fingers crossed we progress further but that was not to be. Two cracking games v Pirates and luck wasn't on our side and we were edged out of the tournament.

It's been a great season being a parent of a player, isn't very different. We love to travel with the team and see them win away and at home, but most of all, see them entertain the fans! Thank you to Mike and the coaching staff, and of course the boys.

Followers Association Constitution.

At the AGM of the Followers on July 7th, a new constitution will be proposed, and I wanted to take this opportunity to let members know this and explain a little of the process we have gone through in drawing up the new one.

At the start of this season, the Followers Committee started a project to review and update where necessary the constitution of the Followers Association. This was carried out by me, the President, reporting at each committee meeting on progress.

The existing constitution was a single A4 page which was last updated in 2005, so reviewing it did not take long!. It was striking when looking at the existing constitution how much was missing and far too much weight was put on conventions that had no written record.

An example of a convention that was un-recorded was that the President having no vote at a committee meeting. This made perfect sense to me, but it needed recording so that all members of the Association knew that was the way we operated.

More importantly, there was little information as to how votes were conducted and decisions affecting all members and deciding to spend Association funds were handled. I believe that the way the committee operates and how decisions are made should be available to all Association members.

In conducting the review, I looked at other rugby clubs, football clubs and a range of other sports but always at their supporters' clubs. Thankfully, a lot of these clubs have their supporter's clubs' constitutions online. It was also good to see that there were only minor variations between most of them.

After looking at a range of documents from other sports and clubs, I wrote a new Constitution for the Bedford Rugby Followers Association, taking the best bits from those other clubs and merging them with the various conventions already followed within the Followers.

After a number of versions, we held a formal vote at the Followers Association Committee meeting in May and the version that will be proposed at the AGM on July 7th was agreed unanimously.

The proposed constitution has been examined by a solicitor who specialises in contract law and has a significant amount of experience with sports contracts. He found no fault with it.

A version of the proposed constitution, and a copy of the old one, will be distributed with other AGM documents a few weeks before the AGM. We will have a free vote of all Association members at the AGM on whether to formally adopt the new constitution or not. If the members vote to adopt it.
